## BUSWELL LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Year ending 30 June 2017

## **Highlights**

- The library faculty developed and implemented the information literacy component of the Christ at the Core first-year and advanced seminars. This coming year we will implement the content for the capstone courses and at least one course for each undergraduate major.
- The **library faculty taught 96 class sessions**, reaching 1,860 students.
- We continue to make great strides in **improving access to collections**, improving cataloguing quality and completeness, and making e-resources more findable. We made major progress in populating the Archon and Portfolio databases (providing access to non-book resources), which are shared across Buswell, Wade, and the Billy Graham Center Archives.
- We implemented a book-delivery service to faculty offices and to Wheaton students at a distance.
- At the request of the Provost, we prepared a document outlining the cost of converting from Dewey to Library of Congress classification. We are ready to proceed with this project when funding becomes available.
- We hosted a symposium on missionary and artist Lilias Trotter, which included guest speakers from on and off campus, showing of a documentary film, and exhibit of primary-source materials on loan from Brian and Sally Oxley.
- We are thrilled to have welcomed three new library faculty members this past year to take the positions of those who have left us to advance their careers elsewhere.

## Challenges

- Move forward with next steps in planning for a new or expanded building. As we await this eventuality, the college must determine a near-term, temporary solution to the need for more stack space. Buswell shelves are full in the main building and close to full at the Special Collections location.
- There are significant, intractable problems with the HVAC system in our existing building. Despite significant attention by the Facilities department, these problems continue.
- The addition of pay-per-view journal article delivery has vastly increased the scope of journal content that we can make available to our students and faculty. The rate of growth is financially unsustainable, however, and we will likely need to reduce access to our faculty and students in the coming years.
- One effect of the increasing technology and digitization is that more and more of our acquisitions budget is dedicated to subscriptions or other large commitments, sometimes extending across multiple-year contracts. This reduces the flexibility of our budget and our ability to absorb annual changes in funding.
- CARLI, the library consortium that funds our catalog, interlibrary loan, and other essential services, is partially funded by the state of Illinois. As funding for public higher education in the state continues to experience sharp decreases, it is unknown what the impact on CARLI will be in the coming year(s).
